## **CURRICULUM VITAE**

### Selected Achievements in Research

1. An international book prize for the best book on the Caribbean published over the past three years (1994-1996) was awarded to my book Caribbean Maritime Security. **The Gordon K. Lewis Memorial Award for Caribbean Scholarship** of the Caribbean Studies Association (CSA) was given to the book at the 21<sup>st</sup> CSA Annual Conference in Barranquilla, Colombia, May 26-31, 1997.

2. **The Senior Scholar Research Excellence Award** of the College of Business and Behavioral Sciences of Clemson University for the best cumulative research record of the faculty, May 8, 1998. CBBS is a college with twelve departments and several hundred faculty.

3. **The 2002 Provost's Award for Scholarly Achievement** awarded at the General Faculty Meeting of Clemson University on May 10, 2002. This university-wide award recognizes scholarly achievement and is accompanied by a \$5,000 stipend.

4. My 2003 book, Languages in a Globalising World, was published by Cambridge University Press, which was judged in a recent survey of American political scientists to be the top-ranking publisher in the world: Goodson, Dillman and Hira, "Ranking the Presses: Political Scientists' Evaluations of Publisher Quality," PS (June 1999): 257-262.

### Selected Achievements in Teaching

1. Awarded **Joint Appointment** in 1996 as Professor of Languages in the Department of Languages in addition to existing position of Professor of Political Science at Clemson University.

2. Awarded several **Fulbright Professorships** for teaching at universities in Great Britain in English and in Chile in Spanish.

3. Created and have taught the basic undergraduate international politics course,

Political Science 102 (Introduction to International Relations), which is now required by numerous departments and has been offered with multiple sections each semester. Inaugurated and have taught advanced undergraduate Political Science courses such as European Integration, North American Integration, Third World Politics, and The Americas in Global Politics. In the Department of Languages, I have regularly taught courses in both French and Spanish including Intermediate Spanish (Spanish 201 and 202), Hispanic Non-Fiction (Spanish 406), and advanced French and Spanish courses on various political topics. I created and have taught two one-hour courses, Spanish 382 ("Current News in Spanish", cross-listed as Political Science 382) and French 383 ("Current News in French," cross-listed as Political Science 383).

### Selected Achievements in Service

1. Recipient of the Clemson University Board of Trustees 1997 **Award for Faculty Excellence** awarded at a dinner sponsored by the Board of Trustees, May 1, 1998. Recipient of the Clemson University Board of Trustees 2000 **Award for Faculty Excellence** awarded at a dinner sponsored by the Board of Trustees, April 19, 2001.

2. Elected **President, the South Carolina Conference of the American Association of University Professors**, in October 1997 for two years. Reelected President for two years on October 16, 1999.

3. The American Association of University Professors (AAUP) **Faculty Award of Merit** awarded at the General Faculty Meeting of Clemson University, May 11, 2000 for excellence in research, teaching and service. This university-wide AAUP award is presented annually to a faculty member who embodies "the high ideals of commitment and dedication to the academic profession, contributions beyond the call of duty to the University and to society, general service to others, and effective representation of their college within the University and to society."

4. **Chair, International Priorities Committee** of Clemson University, 1995-2004. This Committee played a central role in the internationalization of the University. This included successive reports detailing and promoting internationalization as well as organization of a high-level symposium on Internationalization of Clemson University in November 2000 convened by the President of the University. I was the co-organizer of this symposium. Sponsored by the President and Provost of the University, as Chair of the Committee I also directed and coordinated inputs for a campus-wide international data bank.
